... a vibrant community of faith, which has gathered for worship since 1836 and in the current building since 1848. If this is your first visit with us, know that we are delighted you are here. Please introduce yourself and be sure to sign our guest signing sheet in the foyer and/or fill-out a Information packed from a welcome folder inside the lobby podium.

Church Office Hours: Monday—Thursday 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Friday— 9 a.m. to noon.

Weather Policy: St. Mark's will post closures to WZZM 13, WOOD TV8, Facebook and our website by 7:00 a.m. or as soon as possible. The decision on afternoon and evening activities will be made separately, posted by noon.

Reserved Accessible Spaces: There are three shorter pews, two in the north transept and one on the north side of the nave. Please only sit there or in the adjoining pews if you have assistive devices or need of extra space.

Safety: The outer doors to the Parish House will be locked fifteen minutes after Services begin with a security guard on duty to be of assistance. Please pay attention to the nearest exit in the Sanctuary. In an emergency, an announcement will be made and children will be ushered to a designated place for safety away from the Church complex.

Parking on Sundays: Limited parking is available in the Parish Lot. If you are able, please consider not parking in the Parish Lot to reserve access for those less mobile. Consider the free metered parking on Pearl, Ionia, Lyon, Fountain and other streets near the church, the Kendall Lot across the street when the gate is up, the upper levels of the GRCC building on Fountain Street (only until 2 p.m.), and the Ellis Parking Lot at 210 Ionia just west of Lyon Street. For the Ellis Lot: vouchers for free parking on Sundays are available from an Usher (must be used with original parking ticket).

Rest Rooms are located on the main level of the Parish House under the exit sign at the top of the Foyer ramp. More rest rooms are available on the second level of the Parish House, if you are able to use the stairs.

Weekly Worship and Prayer at St. Mark's: Eucharist on Sundays at 8:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. Midweek Eucharist on Wednesdays at noon from September through May. Compline (Night Prayer) on Mondays at 8:00 p.m. via Facebook.

Sunday School: We offer children's and youth formation, including Make a Joyful Noise with Mr. Alex, from 9:15 a.m. to 10:15 a.m. Nursery care for children under kindergarten is available from 9:15 a.m. through the 10:30 a.m. Service. For more information please contact Jeff Brown, Director of Faith Formation, at jeffb@stmarksgr.org.

Youth Ministry: Grand Rapids Episcopal Youth: G.R.E.Y. is a joint youth ministry between St. Mark's and St. Andrew's Episcopal Churches for grades 6-12. We have regular formation gatherings during the school year and service as well as social activities throughout the year. Our Director of Faith Formation is Jeff Brown, jeffatgrey@gmail.com.

After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

The Nicene Creed

- Lector II: We pray for all bishops, priests, and deacons: Sean, Presiding Bishop; the Standing Committee of the Episcopal Diocese of the Great Lakes; Bonnie and Rayford, Bishops of Michigan and Northern Michigan; Moises, Bishop of the Dominican Republic and Craig, ELCA Bishop of the North/West Lower Michigan Synod; the Bishop Whittemore Foundation; St. Matthew of Saginaw and its Priest, Mary Jo Hudson; Church of the Epiphany of South Haven and its Priest, John Wakefield. We remember the Church of the Province of the Indian Ocean. We pray: O God, hear us.
- *Lector I:* For the President, Congress, our Governor, our Mayor and for all in authority, that they may be people of justice, integrity and truth. We pray: **O God, hear us.**
- Lector II: For the good earth which God has entrusted to us, and for the wisdom and will to conserve it. We pray: **O God, hear us.**
- *Lector I:* For the poor and the oppressed, the unemployed, the homeless, refugees and for all who seek a better way of life. We pray: **O God, hear us.**
- Lector II: For those who suffer from any grief or trouble. Give us grace to respond to the needs of those in distress, especially those who suffer because of hatred, racism, bigotry, violence and war. We pray: **O God, hear us.**
- Lector I: For those who celebrate birthdays or anniversaries this week. Bless them with joy and well-being. We pray: **O God, hear us.**
- Lector II: For all those on our Parish Prayer List, our military personnel, the sick, all those for whom we have promised to pray and those we now name silently or aloud. (Pause to add additional names silently or aloud). We pray: O God, hear us.

Lector I: For all who have died in the hope of the resurrection. May they rest in peace and may light perpetual shine upon them.(Pause to add additional names.) We pray: **O God, hear us.**

Lector II: For what else or whom else shall we pray today? (Pause to add additional prayers.)
We pray: O God, hear us.

Deacon: For all these prayers we have named aloud and those which lie deep within our hearts.

We pray: O God, hear us.

The Confession of Sin

Presider: Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Presider and People:

Have mercy upon us, most merciful Father; in your compassion forgive us our sins, known and unknown, things done and left undone; and so uphold us by your Spirit that we may live and serve you in newness of life, to the honor of your Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.





It Takes a Church: Thank you to Rev. David, Rev. Hugh, Canon Tracie, Canon Sunil, Rev. Alan and Deacon Jan, as well as to our staff, Choir, musicians, Altar Guild and all other ministry and member volunteers who made our Passion Sunday, Holy Week and Easter Services possible. Your efforts are seen and greatly appreciated. Alleluia.

Building Project Update: We have been in communication with five different construction companies about responses to our construction management Request for Proposal (RFP). The last of five did a walk through the building this week, and we will have all proposals by the week of April 29th. The Building Planning Team will meet with our architects to review the proposals and recommend a vendor to the Vestry. We anticipate choosing a construction firm and project manager by mid—May. We will then work with that firm to set up an initial construction schedule, realizing that it will be adjusted as we progress through the project. We will communicate with the congregation as that work moves forward. We will continue to work

with local foundations and sources of public funds to help ensure broad financial support for the project.

There Is Power In Showing Up: Can you commit eight to ten hours a year to support the work of Together West Michigan (TWM)? We're not asking you to chair a committee, go to weekly meetings or meet with public officials (though you might choose to!), but there are a few times a year when TWM leaders from St. Mark's need parishioners to show up and become informed allies. One of those times is the Delegates Assembly, April 26th from 10 a.m. to noon. Please review the flyer on the lobby bulletin board or through the eNews link and sign up. You will learn:

- What's keeping local people up at night
- What's being proposed to address those concerns
- How the united efforts of the 18 or so organizations that make up TWM can really make a difference.

The second part is pretty self evident— every cent donated to UTO goes to support worthwhile projects here in our country and throughout the world— "serving the least of these". But, what about the 'building better Christians' part? To me, the more we observe and respond to the bounty that we receive from God every single day, the closer we come to being the mindful and generous followers that God wants us to be. And UTO is built around using thank offerings as an expression of gratitude. I am thankful for this church family and for UTO." ~ Nancy
